




Year 6

Since returning to school we have been teaching reading through whole class reading lessons.

We have been reading a range of fiction and non-fiction extracts.

This term we will be focusing on developing our inference reading skills.



Reading - home learning

They need to:



Read for pleasure twice and complete two reading reflections in planners.

Complete four reads and two vocabulary activities using the Reading Plus program each week.

Maths

- This term we will be covering the final 'big' area of Y6 maths - Fractions, Decimals, Percentages and the links between the them.
- After that, we will cover some of the specifically Y6 objectives, such as Ratio and Proportion
- Then, we will cover the areas that build on their understanding from previous year groups such as Shape, Angles, Position and Direction, Statistics.







Literacy Driving subject


- Book study learning revolves around events and themes in the text.
