This week we are going to <u>'recap the suffixes</u> <u>—less, -ness, -ful, -ly and -ment</u>

- Can you think of any words that you looked at last term ending in –less, -ness, -ful, -ment and -ly?
- Write them down on a piece of paper or tell your adult.
- Can you remember what are the 'spelling principles' when you add in —less, -ness, -ful, -ment and -ly to a word?
- Top TIP: Think about add, change, chop and double?

Add –less, –ness, –ly, -ful and -ment

• If a suffix **starts with** a <u>consonant letter</u>, the suffixes are usually added straight on without changing the root word. E.G. <u>k</u>indness and <u>h</u>opeful

• Look at these spellings and decide if they follow this rule or not. Write down or tell your adult your answers yes or no. (Answer sheet is on the next slide).

• 1) sadness 2) badly

• 3) careful 4) hopeless

• 5) enjoyful 6) lovely

• 7) playful 8) fearless

• 9) plainness 10) enjoyment

ANSWERS

- sadness = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: sad+ness
- badly = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: bad + ly
- careful = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: care+ful
- hopeless = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: hope + less
- enjoyful = No! This is not a word and it begins with a vowel.
- *lovely* = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: love + ly
- playful = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: play+ful
- fearless = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: fear + less
- plainness = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: plain+ness
- *enjoyment* = Yes! The suffix is added straight on to the root word: enjoy + ment

Exception to the spelling principle

• To add -ment to the word 'argue', you must remove the 'e' before adding the suffix.

• argue + ment arguement argument

<u>Change</u> 'y' for and 'i' and add —ness, -less, -ful and -ment

- When the root word has more than one syllable and the last letter is a -y with a consonant before it.
- THEN you change the 'y' for an 'i' and add —ful or -ness

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E.G. happ<u>y</u> = happ<u>i</u>ness
plent<u>y</u> = plent<u>i</u>ful
penn<u>y</u> = penniless
happ<u>y</u> = happily
merry = merriment
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Top Tip:

- Not all root words can have all the suffixes

 ness, -less, -ful, -ly and -ment added to them but some root words can use more than one ending!
- Your job is to know which root word can have —ness. —less, -ful, -ment and —ly added to them!
