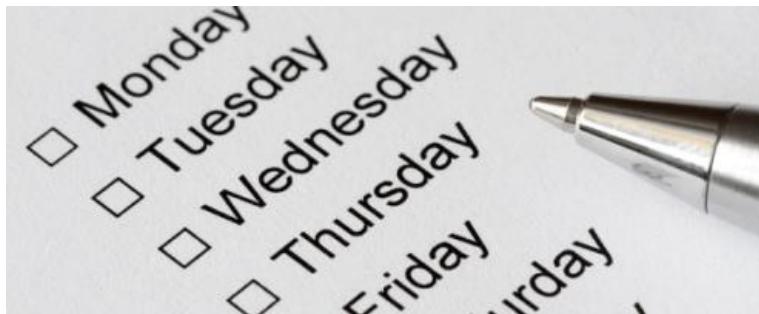
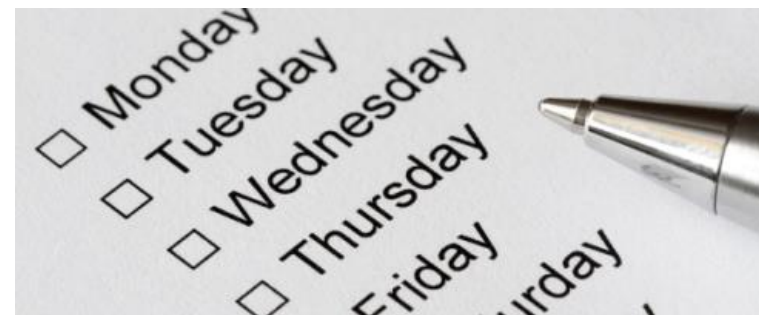

This week



I am setting you some spelling tasks linked to one of your Year 6 spelling principles as well as some tips on how the principle works and those dreaded exceptions!

This week we will look at the –ible and -ibly endings and then you are going to combine these words to –able and –ably which we looked at last week.

Recap spelling principle –able and -ably

- By adding –able or –ably, you create an **adjective!**
- The suffix –able means ‘to be able to’ or ‘capable of’.
- So if you can say ‘I am able’ to do something = E.G. I am able to agree
= agreeable

RULES





How do you use this suffix?



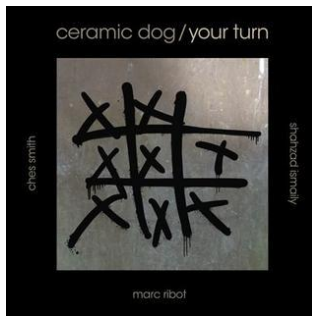
- In a word which ends in –able or ably the ‘s’ sounds like a ‘z’ when you say the word.
- E.G. For advisable you say ‘adviZable’ but spell it ‘adviSable’.
- To help you remember this principle, try to remember this saying:
- ‘If ‘s’ is pronounced ‘z’ and it sounds like a word up ahead, then the word ending ‘able’ is certainly on the table!’
- ALSO
- If you drop ‘**able**’ **from the word it** leaves a generally recognisable word,
- e.g. *agreeable* = *agree*, reasonable = reason, enjoyable = enjoy
- **OR**
- CHOP the final ‘e’ in the root word and add the –able.
- e.g. *value* = *valuable*, *measure* = *measurable*

Spelling Principle of –ible and -ibly

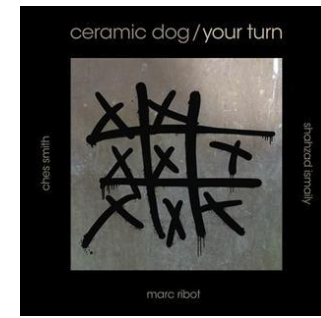


- Again these suffixes turn words into adjectives.
- BUT this time, if the word in front is NOT a recognisable word, then you use –ible or –ibly.
- poss = possible (not possable?)
- horr = horrible (not horrable?)

Top TIP: Remember there are over 900 words with the suffix –able (and still expanding) AND only 200 words with the suffix –ible.
So you are less likely to use –ible!
