





# Welcome back to Year 4 Home Learning Spellings with Mrs Andrews




I will send you:

# If you were to spell these two words, what would they have in common?










#### They both end with the suffix '-sion' that sounds like /shun/.

 Do you notice anything about all of these words with the '-sion' pattern? Top Tip: Think of the root words!


# All of the words that end in 'sion' have a root word that ends in either **de** or **se**.

confu*sion* = confide

- division = divide inclusion = include
- invasion = invade explosion = explode
- decision = decide
- collision = collide television = television
- erosion = erode
  revision = revision


# Can you work out what these words mean from the sentences? Discuss your thoughts with an adult.

- division = Addition, subtraction, division are mathematical operations.

- inclusion = Everyone's inclusion in the game is important.

- revision = I must do my revision before my tests so I can improve.
- invasion = The Vikings invaded England.
- confusion = The man was confused when he saw the sign.




### The words meanings are...

- division means separating into parts (think maths).
- **decision** means the act of deciding something or solving a question.
- explosion means a violent shattering of something or a sudden outburst of something like anger.
- erosion means the gradual wearing away of something.
- **collision** means one moving object striking another object.
- television is a piece of equipment with a screen to watch programmes.
- **revision** means the act of learning, changing or improving something.
- **invasion** means the act of entering a place in an attempt to take control of it.
- **confusion** means to be unsure about what is happening.
- inclusion means the act of including someone or something as part of a group.
