




# I hope you have had a good week and now ... it is time to do some spellings!






- Every week, I will send you:

## Answers to the homophones



- ascent: the act of ascending (going up).
- •assent: to agree/agreement (can be a verb and noun).
- bridal: to do with a bride at a wedding.
- bridle: reins for controlling a horse.
- cereal: made from grain (e.g. breakfast cereal).
- serial: adjective meaning a succession of things one after the other.

#### To Learn how to spell words with Silent Letters

- Can you think of any words with silent letters (i.e. letters whose presence cannot be predicted from the pronunciation of the word)?

- What are the spelling principles for words with silent letters?



# **The Spelling Principles**



- Well, actually there are <u>no</u> actual spelling rules that I can teach you! You just have to know them! Sorry!
- Many words in English have silent letters. Silent letters are letters that you can't hear when you say the word, but are there when you spell the word.
- Can you spot the silent letters in these words?



In this lesson, we are going to concentrate on words that contain a silent 'b', silent 'k' or silent 'n'.



## Let's watch this BBC Bite size clip





- Silent letters are letters that can't be heard when the word is spoken.
- For example in the word 'sword', you don't pronounce the letter 'w'. And the letter 'h' is silent in the word 'ghost'.
- There are lots more examples of words with silent letters in the English language. So keep an eye out for them, because you won't be able to hear them!


#### The answer is ...thumb

## The answer is... knight

 Some letters which are no longer sounded used to be sounded hundreds of years ago. E.G. in knight, there was a /k/ sound before the /n/ sound!











## These words mean...



- knight = A medieval mounted soldier who served his King or Lord
- knuckle = Part of your finger at the joint to helps your finger bend.
- knot = A fastening made by looping a piece of string or rope or material and tightening it.
- solemn = Formal and serious.
- autumn = A season in the year before winter.
- column = An upright pillar or a vertical division of a page like in maths.
- doubt = Having a feeling of uncertainty or being unsure.
- lamb = A baby sheep.
- debt = A sum of money that is owed.
- thumb = The short, thick digit of a hand which is lower than the fingers.
