




Welcome back to Year 4 Home Learning Spellings with Mrs Andrews


 Last week we looked at making a long /a/ sound using which letter pattern?



This week we are going to look at ...


grey



With an adult, talk about the word...

prey

Now use the word and say it in a sentence. Be careful because it is a **homophone**.

For example: While watching the wildlife programme, I watched the cheetah chase its **prey**.



Top Tip: A homophone is a word that sounds the same as another word but has a different spelling and different meaning. prey and pray are homophones

With an adult, now talk about the word...

hey

When might you hear this word used? Tell your

adult when you could use this word?

For example. "Hey! Good to see you!"

shouted the girl cheerfully to her

old friend.

'Hey' is an informal word that is often used in speech to greet people. Such as in a diary or speech in a story.



With an adult, now talk about the words...

obey and disobey

Obey means to follow commands or orders or rules.

What does 'disobey' mean? Think back to when You did prefixes such as dis.

The prefix 'dis' means not.

For example. The child disobeyed his mum's request to lay the table ready for tea.
