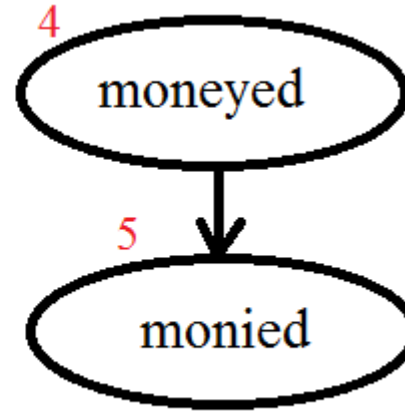
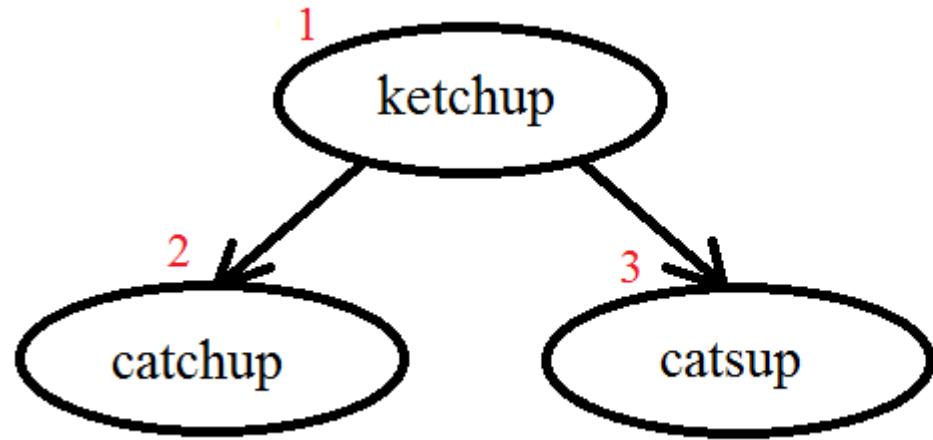

and now ... it is time to do some spellings!

This half term, is recap half term!

- **This half term, we are going to recap the spelling principles that you either learnt with your class teachers or with me during your Home Learning. I will be referring you back to the previous Home Learning power points when we are discussing the spelling principles.**
- **This week we are going to focus on the prefixes 'mis' and 're' which you learnt with your class teachers after Christmas.**

Prefixes

- So we know from last week that a prefix is a letter or a group of letters added to the front of a root word to change the meaning of the word.
- They are not words in their own right!
- The root word always stays the same when the prefix is added to the front.
- There are many prefixes. In the Spring term you looked at many prefixes with your class teachers.
- **What do the prefixes 'mis' and 're' do the meaning of the word when they are added to the front of the root word?**

Prefix 'mis'



- The prefix **mis** – a negative meaning.
- The prefix **mis means wrong**.
- For example, mistake or misunderstand.
- **mis–**: misbehave and misspell (mis + spell... look 2 'ss'!)
- Can you think of any words which start with the prefixes 'mis'?
- Tell your adult.
- For example. misbehave means the opposite of behave (or not to behave)
- prefix 'mis' + root word 'behave' = new word 'misbehave'

Did you think of these words? What do they mean?

- misbehave, mislead, misspell
- mistake, misread, mishear
- misunderstanding, misuse and misplace

What does the prefix 'mis' mean?

- misbehave means to have the wrong understanding.
- mislead means make someone have the wrong idea or opinion.
- misspell means to have spelt a word wrong.
- mistake means to have done something wrong.
- misunderstanding to wrongly understand something.



Prefix 're'



- The prefix **re** – ‘**again**’ or ‘**back**’.
- **re—**: redo, refresh, return, reappear, redecorate (re + root word)
- Often the tricky bit to spell is the root word!
- Can you think of any words which start with the prefixes ‘re’?
- Tell your adult.
- For example: rebuild means to build it **again**
- prefix ‘re’ + root word ‘build’ = new word ‘rebuild’

Did you think of these words? What do they mean?

redo

rebuild

rewrite

redecorate

refresh

rearrange

return

What does the prefix 're' mean?

redo – to do again

rebuild – to build again

rewrite – to write (a thing) again

reappear – to appear again

're' means again,
